Worried about money?

Cancer can have a significant impact on many aspects of a person's life, including their financial security. At a time when people should be focused on getting through treatment and getting well, many are worried about money. That's why every year, Friends of the Cancer Centre provides £145,000 in financial grants to people across Northern Ireland who are attending the Northern Ireland Cancer Centre in Belfast or the North West Cancer Centre in Derry/Londonderry for treatment.

This can help with:

Heating costs | Travel costs to and from hospital | Household bills

How to access financial support:

- Financial support is available to cancer patients currently undergoing treatment who are attending the Northern Ireland Cancer Centre in Belfast or the North West Cancer Centre in Derry/ Londonderry
- Grants are not means tested, but are administered through the social work teams at both hospitals
- If you would like to avail of a grant, please ask your treatment team to refer you to the hospital's social work department. A social worker will then be assigned to you and they will be on hand to advise on the charity's grants, as well as other support which might be beneficial
- The social worker will then apply for a grant on your behalf

By funding Soraya's post, the charity has helped establish a new head and neck cancer service in the Northern Health and Social Care Trust, allowing people to access vital support closer to home. Your support in action

In addition to funding Soraya's vital work, the charity has also recently funded a number of new staff, including:









"I'm proud to be here for head and neck cancer patients"

At the heart of everything we do are the staff we fund and we can see the impact they have on local people affected by cancer every day. The charity very proudly supports a team of 51 additional staff members throughout cancer services in the Belfast Health and Social Care Trust and the Western Health and Social Care Trust. Thanks to your support, the charity has recently been able to extend its support to the Northern Health and Social Care Trust, by funding its first and only Clinical Nurse Specialist for Head and Neck Cancer patients. This funding has enabled the trust to provide a new patient service to those with head and neck cancer, allowing people with this complex diagnosis to receive care close to their home.

Soraya Manoucheri, who is based at Antrim Area Hospital, provides dedicated care and support for those with this complex group of cancers, including thyroid cancer and disease of the mouth, throat, voice box and nose. In Northern Ireland, there are over 300 cases of head and neck cancer each year, with 81 of those diagnosed in the Northern Health and Social Care Trust. Prior to Friends of the Cancer Centre funding this new post, patients would not have received the support of a clinical nurse specialist until they went to Belfast for treatment. Thanks to the charity's funding, Sorava's role will be based at Antrim Area Hospital, which will enhance the care experience patients have and provide access to specialist

nursing support in their local trust and closer to home.

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Soraya joins a team of 22 specialist nurses supported by Friends of the Cancer Centre who provide vital care across 16 different cancer sites. Talking about the difference her post will make, Soraya explained:

"I am incredibly proud to be appointed Clinical Nurse Specialist for Head & and Neck Cancer and my role will focus on supporting patients from the time they are diagnosed, through their treatment and into their recovery.

"An important part of my role will be to act as a key link between the different hospitals and teams involved in a patient's care. We understand that this can be a very apprehensive time for those affected by head and neck cancer and their loved ones. By guiding them through it, I hope to alleviate some of that stress and anxiety. For example, for those head and neck cancer patients who require further surgery or oncology treatment, I will help prepare them for this by coordinating with the Belfast Health and Social Care Trust and the Western Health and Social Care Trust. I will also provide support post-treatment when a patient returns to the Northern Health and Social Care Trust. This is really significant as it means a patient has continuity of care across different hospitals, which can really help alleviate some of their worry.

"Head and neck cancers can be complex and treatment can have many challenging side effects which can impact on quality of life, cause distress and affect recovery. My role will also be really beneficial in supporting patients, by being on hand as their key worker and as a point of contact for them to ask questions about their treatment and wellbeing. I will also be able to refer and signpost to services which will help them navigate these challenges.

"This is a brand new role and with it comes many opportunities to enhance the care offered to people affected by head and neck cancers. I would like to thank everyone who supports Friends of the Cancer Centre as your donations and fundraising have helped make this role possible."

"We are very grateful to Friends of the Cancer Centre for funding this brand new post, as we know it will make a real difference to those affected by head and neck cancer. We are delighted that Soraya's role is the first funded by the charity in the Northern Health and Social Care Trust, expanding the reach of the charity's work in patient care.

"We know that this role will have a hugely positive impact on this patient group, who often need additional support given the complex nature of their diagnosis. This new role will provide them with continuity of care at all stages of their diagnosis, treatment and into survivorship. Soraya will make a real difference to her patients and we look forward to seeing how the role develops and progresses."



"I would encourage all men to check themselves regularly."

In 2019, 40 year old Mark Black from Ahoghill was diagnosed with testicular cancer. Mark has been under the care of Friends of the Cancer Centre's Urology Clinical Nurse Specialist, who has supported him since his diagnosis. Today, Mark is doing well and he has joined forces with the charity's Talking Balls campaign, which is encouraging men across Northern Ireland to check their testicles regularly.

Looking back at his diagnosis, Mark said:

"I had pain in my testicle for some time, but like many of us do, I kept putting off going to the doctor. Eventually the pain became so bad and my testicle had swollen so much, that I was starting to find work difficult. I did eventually go to my GP and they referred me straight to A&E at Antrim Area Hospital. I was diagnosed the next day with testicular cancer.

"I had surgery soon after and thankfully this was sufficient treatment, so I did not have to have radiotherapy or chemotherapy. I am under the care of Dr Oladipo and Dr Carser at the Northern Ireland Cancer Centre, who are looking after me really well. Mel, my

specialist nurse, is also on hand should I have any questions or queries, and that has been so reassuring at times when I've been worried. I have check-ups every month to ensure that everything is still ok following my surgery."

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Mel McNally, Friends of the Cancer Centre's Urology Clinical Nurse Specialist, supports men diagnosed with testicular cancer and their loved ones. Recognising that for many of her patients a cancer diagnosis might be difficult to come to terms with, Mel is on hand to guide them through their treatment and beyond. Mel provides psychosocial support, helping them to cope with treatment, any side effects and other financial, social or emotional difficulties they might face.

Speaking about how Mel supported him, Mark said:

"The support that Friends of the Cancer Centre provides for posts like Mel's is absolutely vital for those affected by cancer in Northern Ireland. Having a knowledgeable voice at the end of the phone or an email, who can reassure, even when you feel like you might be asking a silly question, is such wonderful support to have. Mel's care and guidance has been so important during my experience of cancer treatment.

"I love to play golf in my spare time, and once I felt well enough, I was determined that I would help raise awareness and funds for Friends of the Cancer Centre to support posts like Mel's. Earlier this year, along with three friends, I completed a 72 hole golf challenge, four rounds in one day, raising £1,660 for the charity. I am delighted that the money we have raised will go towards supporting people when they need it most, just as Mel has done for me. I saw this as a way to give back to the staff who have supported me so well, through doing something I really enjoy. We are hoping to make this a yearly challenge to support the charity, and hopefully it will be even bigger and better next year!

Vital support for people with blood cancer

Every year in Northern Ireland, over 800 people are diagnosed with a form of blood cancer.

Blood cancers develop in cells in the blood, which can affect the production of these cells and also how they work. There are three main groupings of blood cancer - leukaemia, lymphoma and myeloma. Each of these groups contain different types of cancer. To support those with blood cancer, Friends of the Cancer Centre is very proud to fund and support a Leukaemia Nurse Specialist, a Lymphoma Nurse Specialist and an Advanced Nurse Practitioner for Haematology. These vital nurses provide care and support to patients through the many different aspects of a blood cancer diagnosis and treatment.



Laura Croan

Advanced Nurse Practitioner for Haematology

Laura provides specialist care for haematology patients at Belfast City Hospital's Bridgewater Suite. Laura's role allows her to carry out many of the same tasks as a doctor including prescribing chemotherapy, performing bone marrow biopsies and reviewing haematology patients across all disease groups.

Leukaemia Nurse Specialist
Lorraine acts as a key worker for

leukaemia patients, providing ongoing contact and continuity of care throughout diagnosis, treatment and post-treatment. Lorraine carries out clinics in the Bridgewater Suite and cares for inpatients on Ward 10 North at Belfast City Hospital.

Lymphoma Nurse Specialist

Andrea provides care and support for outpatients and inpatients who are receiving treatment on the haematology wards at Belfast City Hospital. She acts as a lynchpin between the various teams involved in a patient's care, as well as being a regular point of contact patients can access with questions or worries about their treatment.

Spotlight On: Nuclear Medicine

Nuclear medicine might sound quite frightening, but it plays a vital role in the diagnosis and treatment of many different types of cancer.

Nuclear medicine scans can help doctors detect cancer or see how a patient is responding to treatment. To do this, a patient will be injected with radiopharmaceuticals, also known as radioactive tracers, and then scanned to show how various parts of the body are working.

For the team in the nuclear medicine department, one of their key priorities is to help patients feel more relaxed when they are in the department.

Leanne Martin, Chief Clinical Technologist at the Northern Ireland Cancer Centre, explains:

"We understand that many patients will be anxious if they need to attend the nuclear medicine department for treatment.

"Thanks to funding from Friends of the Cancer Centre, we have been able to refurbish our waiting area to offer people comfortable seating and some calming wall art.

"This has made the area a more comfortable environment for patients and families to wait on their procedure."

Patients will visit the nuclear medicine department for diagnosis, analysis and treatment of disease sites. Leanne continues:

"Patients are administered with a radioactive tracer, which needs to be given shortly after preparation as the radioactive materials have a short life span in which they can be used. For diagnostic procedures, once the radioactive tracers have reached the desired area of the body, the patient will be scanned, helping to detect cancer or other disease process, and also monitor disease progression or response to treatment. The patient may be scanned using a gamma camera or PET-CT scanner."

The nuclear medicine department now houses one of only two PET-CT scanners in Northern Ireland. Mariana Pinto, PET Chief Clinical Technologist, explains:

"A PET-CT scan produces a detailed 3D image of the inside of the body, focusing on processes and molecular activity. Unlike CT or MRI scans, PET-CT scans can show how well parts of the body are working, rather than solely images of what they look like. PET and CT scans are often combined to give the most detailed picture possible of a tissue or organ of interest."

Given the materials staff are working with and patients are exposed to, safety is of the utmost importance to the team in the department. The charity is currently working with the nuclear medicine team to purchase an automatic dose dispenser for the PET-CT scanner. This will safely prepare the correct dose of radioactive tracers, resulting in staff having to handle the radioactive dose less often when preparing it, helping reduce their radiation exposure.
